

North West Education Department Holds Lekgotla to Close Performance Gaps and Tighten Accountability

The North West Department of Education opened a two-day Lekgotla to review and close performance gaps identified in the 2024/25 Annual Performance Plan and to align corrective actions with the 2025/26 fiscal year. The Lekgotla is taking place at the Seasons Wedding Conference Center in Mahikeng, bringing jointly senior managers to set clear targets and strengthen internal capacity within the department.

MEC for Education Viola Motsumi said the Lekgotla will mainly put focus on practical measures to enhance service delivery and accountability in the department.

"It is very wrong for departmental employees not to comply with the department's standards," Motsumi expressed.

Motsumi further emphasized that consequence management must be applied to those employees failing to meet commitments and that internal staff should be empowered to carry out work rather than relying on external consultants where capacity exists.































Over these two days, senior managers reviewed the 2024/25 performance shortfalls and mainly agreeing on targeted interventions and timeframes to ensure that there are improved outcomes in the coming financial year.

The Lekgotla was called to translate audit findings by the Auditor General and performance reviews into a solid action plan that strengthens service delivery to learners and schools across the province.

Motsumi called for a cultural shift toward greater ownership and improved professional standards within the department. She urged senior managers to prioritise skills development and redeployment of existing employees, decrease dependence on consultants, and ensure value-formoney in public spending.

"Where we have most competent employees, we need to use them and develop them further. This will improve oversight, reduce costs, and ensure sustainability of programmes aimed at improving learner outcomes," Motsumi expressed.

The Lekgotla concluded on 08 October with a comprehensive plan that places performance targets, designates responsibilities, and establishes a schedule for progress reporting. The Department, through this Lekgotla, anticipated that the outcomes of this meeting will drive measurable improvements in curriculum support, administration, and school infrastructure management in the 2025/26 fiscal year.

NW Education hosts Pre-cursor Makgotla in preparation for the main Departmental Lekgola By Godfrey Seatle

In an effort to prepare for a smooth driven and outcome based Departmental Lekgotla planned for earlier in October 2025, the North West Department of Education hosted Precursor Branch Makgotlla to plan extensively for the main 2025 Departmental Lekgotla.

For the first in the history of the Department, all Branches (Corporate Services Branch, Curriculum Management and Institutional Management, Governance and Support Branch) were subjected to mini Makgotla to prepare thoroughly for the 2025 Departmental Lekgotla that was held on the 07-08 October 2025, at Seasons Wedding Centre in Mahikeng Ngalka Modiri Molema.

The Pre-cursor Makgotla started with Corporate Services Branch on the 23rd of September 2025) at Bophelong Special; School and ended on the 29th of September 2025 with the remaining Branches, Curriculum Management and Institutional Branches hosting the final leg of Pre-cursor Makgotla at Bophelong Special School in Mahikeng. The Makgotla committed all Chief Directorates and Directorates forming a Branch to engage on robust discussions and deliberations on how to align the Strategic Plan, Annual Performance Plan and the Standard Operation Procedures of the North West Department of Education with the intension to minimise the gaps and strengthen synergy as well as outcome based performance.

More of its focus was on putting more emphasis on the importance of Promoting a Performance Team and Operationalizing the agreement reached through the engagement in ensuring that the Department achieve the outcomes contained in its Strategic Plan. The Makgotla were tasked to ensure that the plenary process should underpin the Policy Prescripts like MTDp/ Sector Priorities/ NDP/ SO A/ SOPA/ POA/ PGDD including IIF.

The Branch Makgotlla are Precursor activities were planned to enable the Department to finalise the 2026/2027 Annual Performance

Plan (APP) on time for approval and submission to the Executive Authority.







SG meets with Independent Schools regarding the Registration of Examination Centres and Contracts with the Department

The Superintendent General(SG) for the North West Department of Education Mr Lengane Bogatsu had a crucial engagement meeting with 38 Independent Schools that are offering Grade 10-12 in the North West Province.

The schools represented all the Districts across the North West Province. The annual General Meeting took place on the 29th September 2025 at Rustenburg High School in Bojanala District. The Superintendent General encouraged schools to improve the Registration process and ensure that they fully partner with Umalusi for accreditation purposes.

He further Said that they should take the 95% pass target of the province into consideration and perform beyond the provincial target to improve the provincial results. It was also revealed during the meeting that some schools were not registered as examination centres and have enrolled learners for Grade12 in 2025.

Part of the discussion were also centred around the importance of compliance and meeting the requirements as a school to avoid compromising the Department in terms of provisioning of curriculum. However, the North West Department of Education had identified those schools for further assistance in terms of examination and registration purposes for the upcoming academic calendar.

It was also emphasised that the process of registration for newly registering or re- registering schools should be done on time annually to enable the evaluation and assessment processess to be finalised on time. The schools were taken through the legislative processes including critical sections of South African Schools Act(SASA) as well as financial and Auditing requirements and procedures that governs the education sector.

The Independent Schools were cautioned to run the finances of the schools properly to ensure that the subsidy provided by the Department is taken care off. The Superintendent General was joined by the Director for Institutional Development Services(IDS). Dr Mojafi, Acting Chief Director for Examination and Assessment, Mr David Moroeng, Director for Assessment, Mr Daliwonga Ntlabathi, Advocate Moremane from Legal Services, Acting Director for Examination, Mr PAG Gill, Director in the office of the HOD, Dr Thabo Phorabatho, Ms Pule Makadu and other Officials of the Department.

Department of Basic Education State of Readiness Support Visit to North West Education Department

The Department of Basic Education conducted a readiness review for the 2025 National Senior Certificate [NSC] Examinations of the North West Department of Education from the 2nd to 3rd October 2025. This two-day assessment session was a joint meeting between Department of Basic Education, Provincial Education Department officials and District Examination Heads. The meeting was held at Rosewood Country Lodge, Rietfontein in Rustenburg, Bojanala District.

The main objective of the meeting was to assess the progress made by the North West Provincial Education Department in speaking to concerns revealed during the previous review, as recorded in the improvement plans.

Furthermore, this review intends to assess the final arrangement relating to printing, storage and distribution of question papers and the general conduct during the examination. DBE also intends to evaluate the systems and process relating to the handling of examination irregularities, preparedness for managing the collection and finalisation of school-based assessment [SBA] marks, as well as to guarantee the quality of marking across all subjects for the October/November 2025 examinations.

The key purpose was to divide the Curriculum, Examination and Assessment officials into breakaway groups and discuss the following issues: printing, packaging and distribution, Invigilator training, writing of the examinations, monitoring plan, marking processes, district state of readiness, risk management, school-based assessment and certification. The aim of group discussions was to ensure that examination creditability is maintained in the country.

In their way-forward and conclusion, the North West Department of Education is

ready to commence with the National Senior Certificate Examinations, which will start on the 21 October 2025, with 453 centres already registered on the IECS system. Furthermore, the Department confirmed that they had hard-line measures in place for the learners and teachers to ensure that they preserved the integrity of the examination process.

Maths, Science and Technology Services held Spring Camps By Godfrey Seatle

in the North West Province

The North West Department of Education in collaboration with South African Institute for Chartered Accountants (SAICA) and South African Actuarial Development Programme (SAADP) put together and conducted a week long Grade 9 Spring Camp at Wagpos Hoerskool in Brits, Madibeng Local Municipality.

The Superintendent General for the North West Department of Education, Mr Lengane Bogatsu met with Technical Schools for Ngaka Modiri Molema District at Solplaatjie Primary School, to have a clear understanding on the challenges that they are facing on the ground as well as assisting them to improve towards the provincial target of 100% pass in Technical Subjects across the province. The assignment to assists Ngaka Modiri Molema schools was given to the Superintendent General by the MEC, Motsumi during her Interactive Sessions with underperforming schools for term 2, throughout the province.

The purpose of the meeting was to address curriculum alignment in Technical Schools, and to have a sense of technical problems affecting curriculum delivery in the affected schools. The Head of Department Mr. Lengane Bogatsu had an engagement with principals, subject specialist and circuit managers of F M Ramaboa, More Technical School, Boitseanape, Onkgopotse Tiro, Ramotshere and Ikageleng Technical Schools on the 21st August 2025 at Sol-Plaatjie Primary School, Ngaka Modiri Molema District.

During the engagement, the Superintendent General highlighted that technical schools should aim for a 100% pass rate and to achieve that, it is important to complete the curriculum and address the challenges that are experienced by schools in line with intervention strategies that the department will provide. Some of the challenges experienced by principals include insufficient budget, butlery in schools, practical activity task (pat) that is done only in technical schools that have resources, including lack of properly arranged workshops in some schools.

The District Director, Ms Eunice Lesetedi clarified that the teachers have been improvising to do training for learners. The classwork that were given to learners is supposed to be illustration for learners to







understand the subject, but if the learners don't have all the paraphernalia that they use, it's going to have an impact on formative activities. Ms Eunice Lesetedi recommended that since Pat (section 21) doesn't have enough money and the learners are starting their preparatory exam next week, technical schools' learners should be assisted with laptops by Mathematics, Science and Technology Section within the Department.

Empowering Young Minds: A 2-Day Oral History Colloquium in North West Province

The 2nd Oral History Colloquium, held on September 25-26, 2025, at Modizen Guest House in Northwest Province, was a resounding success. 

The importance of indigenous games was also emphasised during the colloquium. Ms. Khumo Fani from Northwest University presented on "#Arethamekeng" indigenous games, highlighting their value in promoting literacy and numeracy skills among learners. She noted that these games could be incorporated into basic education to keep learners engaged and motivated.











Mr. Mojuta Motlhamme from North West University added depth to the discussion, speaking about the history of Sadt Primary School, which was established in 1878 by Silas Thelesho. Handover of Vehicles to NSNP Offices at Districts Level

National School Nutrition Programme (NSNP) is a government initiative that provides Learners with nutritious meal per day in no fee paying schools. These meals compose of starch (pap, rice, stamp), protein (fish, soya, beans, milk) fresh fruits and vegetables The NSNP supports learners in maintaining regular school attendance, improving concentration, and enhancing overall learning capacity.

On 18 August 2025, the Provincial programme manager Mr Richard Mogorosi handed over seven Ford Ranger vehicles to the value of R2.6 million to the NSNP districts and local education offices.

The vehicles allocation is as follows:

- Ngaka Modiri Molema district office,
- Tswaing Local Education Office,
- Ramotshere Moilwa LEO,
- Bojanala district office.
- Rustenburg LEO,
- Madibeng LEO and
- Greater Taung LEO.

Mr Titus Seboko, Learner Social Support Services director outlined that one of the findings from Auditor General was that there was little monitoring of NSNP in schools. He highlights that with the handover of these vehicles, NSNP officials will be able to ensure that there is intensive monitoring and support as the schools will be easily accessible.

The recipients of the vehicles were encouraged by the NSNP manager, Mr Mogorosi to take care of the vehicles and treat them as their own transport. He also emphasised that these vehicles are for the sole purpose of NSNP only.

The transport manager Mr Tinye, reminded beneficiaries that they should ensure that route forms are authorised before a trip. They should also keep a record of the monitoring plan, route form and petrol slips.

One of the beneficiaries, Ms Lorato Maise from Ramotshere Moilwa LEO stated that it is an honour and privilege for their office to be allocated such a vehicle as their service area is rural and it will enable them to visit schools even in deeper rural areas

DEFINITION AND DIFFERENCE BETWEEN MENTAL HEALTH AND MENTAL ILLNESS

Mental health refers to anyone's mental and emotional well-being, whereas Mental Illness refers to diagnosed condition that significantly affect an individual's thoughts and behaviours.

MENTAL HEALTH

The World Health Organisation (WHO) (2022) defines mental health as 'a state of mental well-being that enables people to cope with the stresses of life, realise their abilities, learn well and work well and contribute to their community'Depression and anxiety disorders are common mental disorders that have an impact on our ability to work productively – WHO

MENTAL ILLNESS

A clinically diagnosable disorder that significantly interferes with an individual's cognitive, emotional or social abilities". According to the National Study of Mental Health and Wellbeing 2020-21. An individual's mental health fluctuates during life time in response to different stressors and circumstances and include periods of poor health but this does not necessarily mean they have a mental illness. On the other hand, someone with a mental illness can achieve good mental health with appropriate treatment.
